## Curing vs. Healing

“Jumping out of bed” or “springing into action” can take on different meanings as we move through different stages and ages in our lives. Our bodies are all prone to decay and disability. As Margaret Deans said, “It’s God’s way to train us to prepare for a new life.” Some of us meet limitations very early in life and others as the years move on, but there is not a person alive who doesn’t have some type of disability, whether it is visible or invisible.

Rev. Frederick Reklau wrote a thought-provoking list of 14 statements about the difference between curing and healing. Some of the things he said include:

- ✧ Cure may occur without healing.
- ✧ Cure separates body from soul; healing embraces the whole.
- ✧ Cure costs; healing enhances.
- ✧ Cure combats sickness; healing fosters wellness.
- ✧ Cure fosters function; healing fosters purpose.

As we work together in this body of Christ at First Broad Street, we seek to remember to keep our focus on the “much more” that God has for us. We often settle for a physical cure when God’s desire for us is true healing.

In Ephesians, Paul encourages us all, “...to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness.”

## A Word from Our Lead Pastor . . .

### Summer Already Planned?

Run, saint, run!  
Demands, decisions, deadlines...run!  
Beaches, ball games, bicycles...run!  
Schedules, flights, don't miss the sights...run!  
Plans, programs, people...run!  
Wait a minute...stop!

Step aside and sit down. Let your motor sit and idle for a minute and just think. What is it down inside your boiler room that keeps pouring the coal on your fire? Caught your breath yet? Now, glance back over your shoulder for two or three months. Could you honestly list anything significant accomplished? How about feelings of fulfillment...very many?

When I was a District Superintendent, I witnessed ministers who went 24/7 and reached many for Christ, but managed to sacrifice their health and their family along the way. The outcome was not pretty. Busyness may feed the ego, but it will also starve the inner person.

Many a church boasts about its active program: "Something every night of the week for everybody." What a shame! The One who instructs us to "be still and know that I am God" must hurt when He witnesses our frantic, compulsive, agitated motions. In place of a quiet, responsive spirit we offer Him an inner washing machine – churning with anxiety, clogged with too much activity, and spilling over with resentment and impatience. God must, at times, watch our convulsions with a heavy sigh.

Someone said once:

"Much of our activity these days is nothing more than a cheap anesthetic to deaden the pain of an empty life."

Challenging words...but true. Want to change?

- (1) First, admit it. You're too busy. Say it to yourself... your family...your friends. Clear some bridges the thorns of neglect have overgrown.
- (2) Second, stop it. Begin to refuse every possible activity which isn't absolutely necessary. Quit feeling so important.
- (3) Maintain it. It's easy to start and fade quickly. Invest some new time with your family and friends.
- (4) Fourth, share it. It won't be long before you begin to glean the benefits of putting first things first. Trust me, there are a lot of activity-addicts with the fellowship of faith who'd love to stop running...if they only know how. Finally, again "be still and know that I am God."

There are twenty questions to answer and an individual must score at least 80%, but you may repeat the training as often as you wish until that score is reached. An automatic background check will also be made, and you will be asked to list two references.
