What's Before You?

My husband, Wesley's grandmother, Lillian, was what some people call "a character." She was a mountain woman who spoke her mind, plain and simple, no flowery language, no extra niceties, just the truth, served up straight. Whenever we had a family gathering where food was involved, the spread would go out on the table and before we were allowed to help ourselves there was a prayer followed by the pronouncement: "You see what's before you." No frill, no extras, just: this is what you get—eat it or leave it.

Human pride leads us to look for that extra special work, the ministry that will change the world, reach the millions—even billions—for Christ. We are reluctant to expend our energies on the one needy soul in our care, the person with memory loss who can't appreciate us, the little child who makes the same mess every day, the frustrating loved one who calls too often.

You see, God doesn't differentiate between the lonely soul next door and someone whom we might characterize as more worthy. God's math, which doesn't always add up neatly in our score-keeping human mind, finds equal value in "Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." Sometimes we like to think that we need special preparation to minister—maybe some kind of degree or experience—but God says, "Not so much. Just do what I put before you today." Some of us are called to go get special training, but most of us are called to simply step out in faith every day and treat our neighbor with true love, right here, right now. He gives each of us the opportunity to minister by using our gifts and tells us—you see what's before you, now get to it!

Caring for Each Other: What Is Before Us?

Do you want to get involved in caring for those in our church family who are going through illness, grief, or long-term loss of mobility? We have many opportunities for you to get involved.

A Word from Our Lead Pastor . . .

He was brilliant. Clearly a child prodigy . . . the pride of Salzburg . . . a performer par excellence.

At age five he wrote an advanced concerto for the harpsichord. Before he turned ten he had composed and published several violin sonatas and was playing from memory the best of Bach and Handel. Soon after his twelfth birthday he composed and conducted his own opera . . . and was awarded an honorary appointment as concert master with the Salzburg Symphony Orchestra. Before his brief life ended, he had written numerous operettas, cantatas, hymns, and oratorios, as well as forty-eight symphonies, forty-seven arias, duets, and quartets with orchestral accompaniment, and over a dozen operas totalling some 600 works!

His official name was Johannes Chrysostomus Wolfgangus Amadeus Theophilus Mozart. With a handle like that, he had to be famous.

He was only thirty-five when he passed on. He was living in poverty and died in obscurity. His widow was quite ill herself and seemed indifferent to his burial. A few friends went as far as the church for his funeral but were deterred by a storm from going to the gravesite. By the time anyone bothered to inquire, the location of his grave was impossible to identify. The unmarked grave of Mozart -- perhaps the most gifted composer of all time -- became lost forever. No granite-engraved etchings mark his final resting place for music lovers to visit. He has joined the immortal . . . forever absent from sight. He is gone.

Or is he? Unlike Ceasar, the good Mozart did lives after him . . . the "Mozart touch." There is no other sound like it. In his music, Mozart lives on.

Like Mozart, life is brief and opportunity is now. Your contribution, small though it may seem, is unique and altogether yours. You may not feel so brilliant, a prodigy, a composer of symphonies. What are you? A mother of two, an executive, a retired military officer, a divorcee, a teacher, a doctor, a widow, a nurse, a minister, an engineer, a lawyer, a salesperson. Your trophy is your contribution. It's your investment, your legacy, your gifted "touch" that will live on far beyond the grave.

October, at First Broad Street, is the month we think about our gift, our investment, our pledge for the year.

It is said of Abel: ". . . God testifying about his gifts . . . though he is dead, he still speaks" (Hebrews 11:4b).

Our opportunity is now. Such trophies never tarnish.

As I walked by the new kneeling benches, I was struck by their elegance and beauty. My hands reached out, almost of their own accord, to touch the smoothness of the finely finished wood. The joints fit together perfectly and the craftsmanship spoke loudly of love.

I knew the hands that had created these beautiful objects. Tom Brock's surgeon's hands never retired from service—going from stitching and repairing delicate tissues of the human body to putting wood together seamlessly.

In scripture we see the premium placed on the fine workmanship of craftsman. In 2 Chronicles 2:13-14, we read, "I am sending you Hiram-Abi, a man of great skill... He is trained to work in gold and silver, bronze and iron, stone and wood, and with purple and blue and crimson yarn and fine linen. He is experienced in all kinds of engraving and can execute any design given to him." God, the Creator, gives us all gifts to be used for his glory and we are blessed that Tom continues to give so generously of his time and loving creations to our church family.

He made the cross and the altar table used in Contemporary worship along with the matching baptismal stand that holds the hand blown glass bowl (a memorial to Janet Barnes). These are made from maple as well as Brazilian cherry and were accomplished with designing help from both Will Lauderback and Harrison Bell. He crafted the attractive signage for the children's areas both on the first and second floors in addition to the corner benches on the second floor. He and Katie Blalock are in the process of dreaming up a Noah's Ark—so there is more to come!

The congregation as a whole wants to thank Tom Brock for allowing God to use his hands to bless all of us. His gifts stand as a challenge inviting us to put our gifts to work for the Kingdom of God. He would be the first to humbly point us to the Master, following the invitation the Apostle Paul laid out in 1 Thes. 4: "Make it your ambition to lead a quiet life, to mind your own business and to work with your hands, just as we told you, so that your daily life may win the respect of outsiders and so that you will not be dependent on anybody." Blessing of the Animals

St. Francis of Assisi first introduced the idea that our compassion for animals mirrors God's love for all of creation. John Wesley strongly believed in the humane treatment of animals. Each year in the fall, hundreds of United Methodist congregations hold blessing of the animals services around the time of the feast day of St. Francis (the day that St. Francis died). This year, First Broad Street will join the celebration!

On Sunday, October 2, you and your pet/s are invited to *All God's Critters*, a Blessing of the Animals Service at FBS. Blessing of pets and their owners will begin at two on the lawn between the church building and E. Church Circle. At 2:30 p.m., Harrison Bell will lead us in a brief service. Blessings will continue after the service and conclude at 3:30 p.m.

All God's critters, large and small, are welcome. Separate blessing stations will be available for dogs, cats, frail and fragile animals, birds and fish, reptiles, and other wild and wooly animals. (Dogs should be on their leashes, cats in carriers, and others contained as appropriate.) Stuffed animals, photographs of pets, or articles belonging to pets (such as horse bridles) also may be blessed. Those who do not currently share their lives with pets also are encouraged to come celebrate all God's critters—there will be enough purrs and wagging tails to go around! As a special treat, police dogs will be present, too!

Guests will have the opportunity to give back by donating spare change to Heifer International. Photographers will be on hand to take pictures so pets in costumes are encouraged and all furry friends will receive a kerchief!

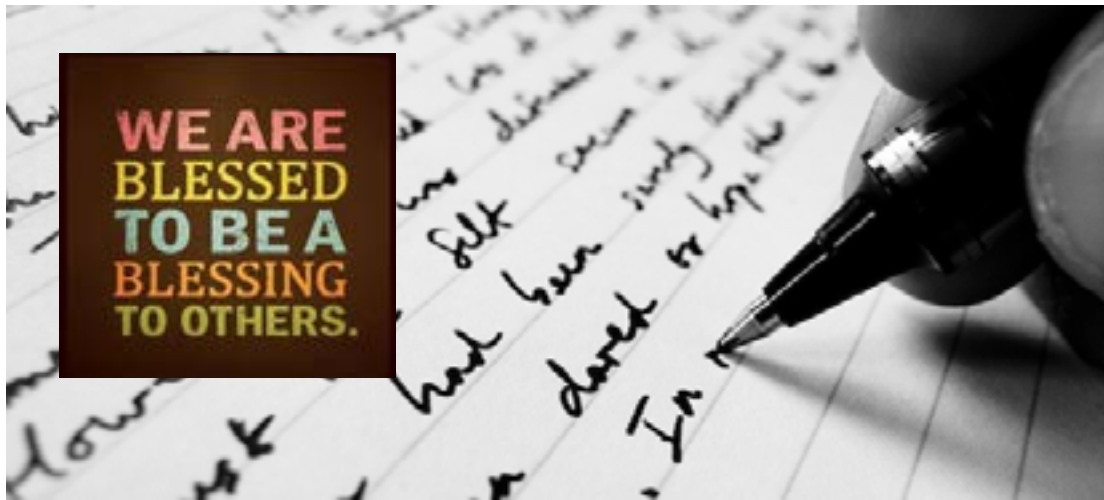
